Major projects have long been viewed as the key economic drivers that lead to positive and sustainable change and growth in Indigenous communities. Many Nations are now lead investors and owners of major initiatives and operations from coast to coast to coast. These projects create sustained wealth, career and capacity building opportunities, local jobs with competitive pay and benefits, and procurement and supply opportunities for small and medium sized businesses.

Organizations such as the First Nations Major Projects Coalition provide tools, capacity supports, and advice related to corporate structures and benefit sharing models. The shared learnings of these 150+ members are helping lead the development of Nations looking to regain their economic independence through major infrastructure, real estate and energy projects.

This panel will explore some of the best examples of Indigenous success in major projects and the key elements needed to advance these big, impactful ventures in a way that leads to timely and sustainable benefits for Indigenous communities.

The Conference Board of Canada, in a study completed in 2021, indicated that at least 1,889 Indigenous businesses participate in Canada's Indigenous tourism sector. Just over 18,000 people work in the sector's associated industries with an estimated \$774 million in GDP.

The Indigenous tourism sector, like many others, was significantly impacted by the pandemic. In 2022, the Federal Government committed \$20M in support of the Indigenous Tourism Fund (ITF) to help the Indigenous tourism industry recover and position itself for long-term growth. Stream 2 of the ITF provided \$10M in support of a new Signature Indigenous Tourism Experiences Stream (SITES) program, announced at last year's Prosperity Forum.





Working with a number of Provincial Indigenous Tourism Organizations, funding was provided to a handful of projects across the country supporting the scaling-up of export-ready, viable, and community-supported offerings that draw high-value tourists to Canada.

In addition to providing an overview of Canada's Indigenous Tourism Sector, this panel will explore some of the successes achieved under the SITES program and what is needed to support other tourism operators grow their businesses and become export ready.
